## Housing Programs

# SERVING 300 HOMELESS FAMILIES EACH YEAR



Homeless families need more than a place to live. They need the resources and skills necessary to be able to sustain permanent housing. Each year our housing programs serve approximately 300 economically disadvantaged, homeless families in Franklin, Delaware and Union Counties with a broad range of supportive services.

The Army's Direct Housing Programs do more than just link families with housing. By tackling the causes of homelessness – such as lack of a living wage, high cost of housing, lack of affordable childcare, lack of adequate transportation, poor rental history or criminal record – our case workers help families secure leases and keep their homes. Families in the program also receive financial

assistance and supportive services to help them gain stability and maintain housing.

### New Program To Serve Families with Disabilities

The Salvation Army has recently received a Housing and Urban Development grant to begin a new program in Delaware County. The Permanent Supportive Housing program will serve economically disadvantaged, homeless families with an adult head of household who has been diagnosed with mental illness. Services will include intervention, long-term

stabilization, needs assessment, permanent subsidized housing placement, landlord advocacy, case management services and life skills training. 🇺🇸

Rader, retired international leader of The Salvation Army and one of the country's most honored public speakers will deliver the keynote address.

Only 18 individuals have held the position of International General, and only one, General Paul Rader, has been from the United States.

You will be inspired by General Rader's presentation; enlightened by The Army's story of helping more than 70,000 adults and children last year; and engaged as we honor our exceptional community partners.

Need Knows No Season will serve as a kick-off to our highest-profile and largest fundraising effort – the Red Kettle Campaign.

Gen. Paul A. Rader

General Rader served as the worldwide leader of The Salvation Army from 1994-1999. He earned his undergraduate degree from Asbury College going on to study at Asbury Theological Seminary and Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, graduating with Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Divinity and Master of Theology degrees. General Rader then went on to Fuller Theological Seminary in California where he earned a doctorate degree.

After receiving training at The Salvation Army School for Officer Training in New York, Rader and his wife, Kay, were commissioned as officers and appointed to Korea. The Raders served there for 22 years returning to the United States in 1983. In 1989, they were appointed territorial leaders for the USA Western Territory, responsible for The Salvation Army's work in 13 Western states.

In 1994, Rader became the international leader of The Salvation Army, commissioned to travel the world spreading The Army's mission to preach the Gospel of Jesus Christ and meet human needs in his name.

General Rader has received honorary doctorates from Asbury Theological Seminary (D.D.), Greenville College (L.H.D.) and Roberts Wesleyan College (D.D.). In 1998, Rader was awarded the Order of Diplomatic Service Merit, Gwanghwa medal by President Kim Dae-jung of the Republic of Korea, 'for distinguished service in the field of mission to the Republic of Korea and the world.'

General Rader retired as international leader of The Salvation Army in July 1999. Soon after his return to the United States, Dr. Rader was elected to the presidency of his alma mater, Asbury College. Rader served there from 2000 to 2006 when he again retired. 🍀

# ONCE YOU GIVE IT AWAY, YOU CAN GIVE IT AWAY AGAIN!

Take a survey of any twenty people on the street, and chances are that most, if not all, will tell you that once you've given something away, that's it. It's gone. Done deal.

And, of course, this is true. Almost all of the time.

But did you know that there is an estate planning concept that actually makes it possible for you to give all or a portion of your estate away twice upon your death? It's true.

We call it the *Give It Twice Trust*, and it's a simple planning option that has particular appeal to those with a small to medium sized estate.

In a nutshell, here's how the concept works.

- 1) Let's use a \$500,000 estate as our example. At death (in the case of a husband and wife, we're talking about the second death), estate assets are transferred into a Trust.
- 2) This Trust generates annual income to charity.
- 3) Simultaneously, each year one-tenth of the Trust principal is transferred to family.

At the conclusion of the ten-year period the original Trust amount – \$500,000 – has been transferred to family without tax; and the income generated by the Trust has been transferred to charity . . . also without any tax due.

In other words, thanks to a little planning, the husband and wife have managed to give the \$500,000 value of their estate away, *twice!*

This plan also has appeal in many situations because it allows mom and dad to transfer an inheritance to children *over time*, thus insuring a level of management . . . even after mom and dad are gone.

The possibility of giving it twice means that many people have found a way to accomplish two important objectives – the desire to bestow an inheritance on family and the desire to see philanthropic dreams realized.

Leonard Hill likes to stay busy. He volunteers at The Salvation Army Choice Food Pantry almost every day, spending up to 30 hours a week helping Pantry staff and clients. Leonard moved to Columbus from

Elyria, Ohio in January, and started volunteering at the Pantry as a way to work off traffic violation fines. He quickly began to view his volunteer work as more of a calling than a job. "I've never left,"

he jokes, describing the many hours he has spent in the Pantry since fulfilling his service requirement.

Leonard's volunteer duties include unloading food shipments, stocking shelves, cleaning the Pantry and helping clients select food items. He likes how the Pantry is organized "like a grocery store," offering clients a variety of items and allowing them to choose what they most want and need. He particularly enjoys arranging displays of fresh fruits, salads and other special items that are not always available in other food pantries.

Leonard finds working with clients most rewarding. "I meet new people every day," he explains. Volunteering at the Pantry "keeps me busy" and "helps me keep a positive focus." He has made friends and even recruited some of the Pantry's clients to help as volunteers. Recently Leonard was surprised to receive a card congratulating him on completing more than 100 hours of volunteer work. "I hadn't been keeping track," he said, smiling. He calls the Pantry a "blessing" in his life that he wants to share with others. 🍷
